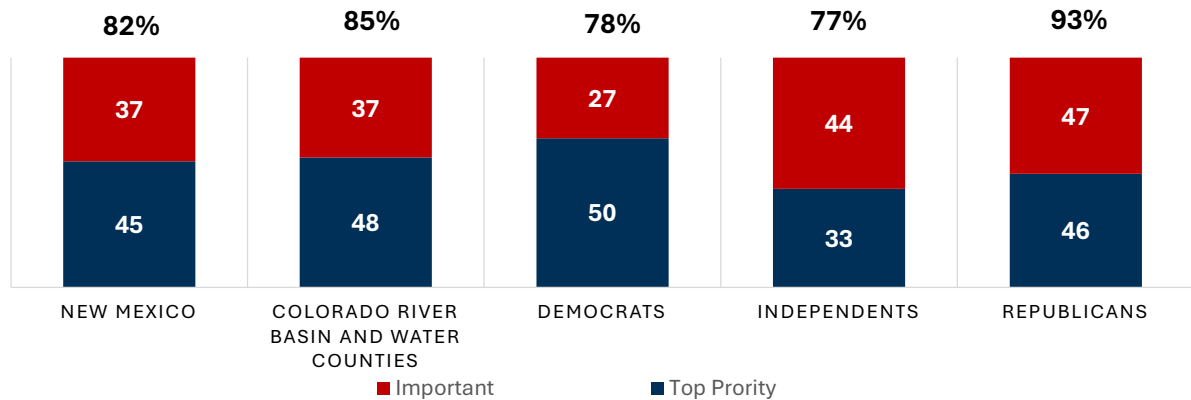


Colorado River Basin Poll Results: New Mexico

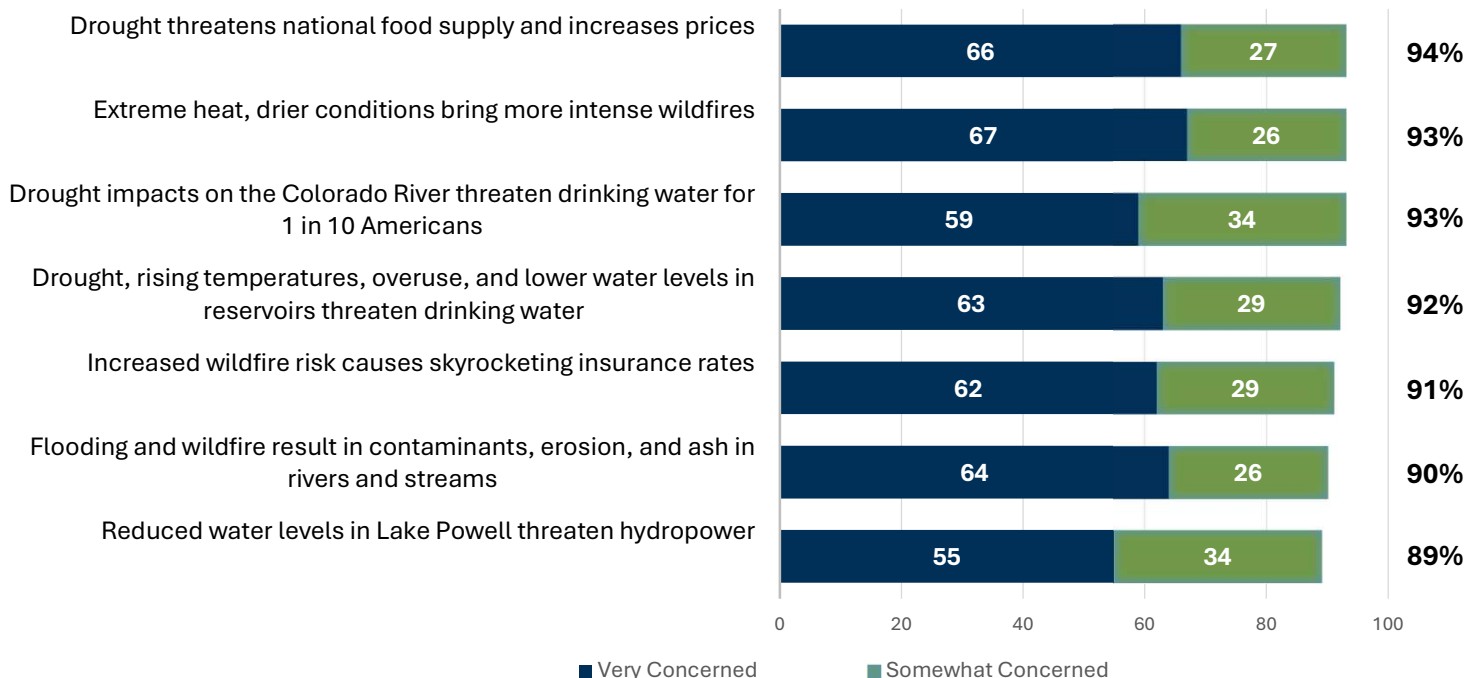
Key Takeaways:

- 82% of New Mexico adults believe addressing drought impacts and diminishing water supplies from the Colorado River is a priority.
- Nearly all New Mexico adults believe that it is important for federal officials (90%) and Colorado state officials (90%) to improve water security in the Colorado River Basin.
- New Mexico adults are concerned drier conditions and diminishing the Colorado River water will increase food prices, bring more intense wildfires, and threaten drinking water supplies.
- New Mexico adults believe government officials should prioritize restoring wetlands, implementing water-saving strategies, increasing agricultural efficiency, and managing forests to protect water supplies. Concern about the drought and diminishing water supplies is a bipartisan issue with high concern across the political parties.

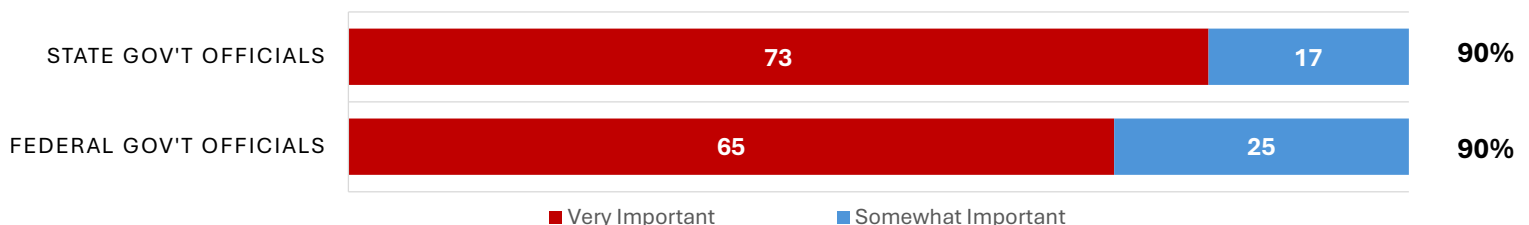
ADDRESSING DIMINISHING COLORADO RIVER WATER SUPPLIES IS A PRIORITY



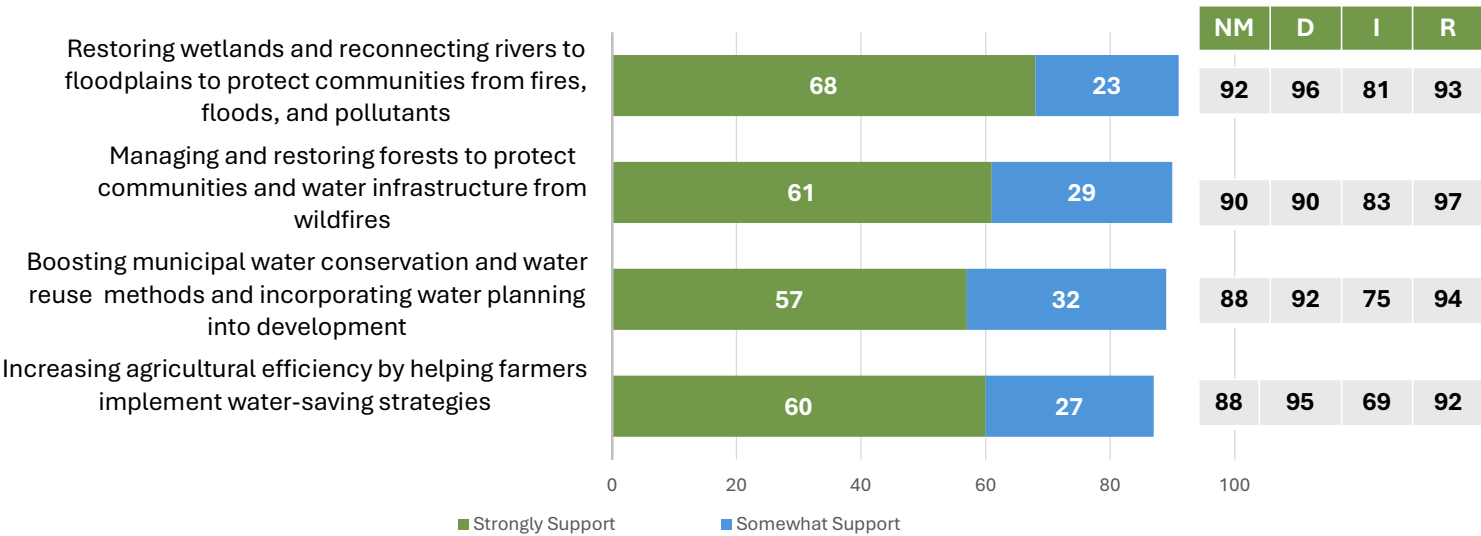
NEW MEXICANS ARE CONCERNED ABOUT DROUGHT AND COLORADO RIVER SUPPLIES



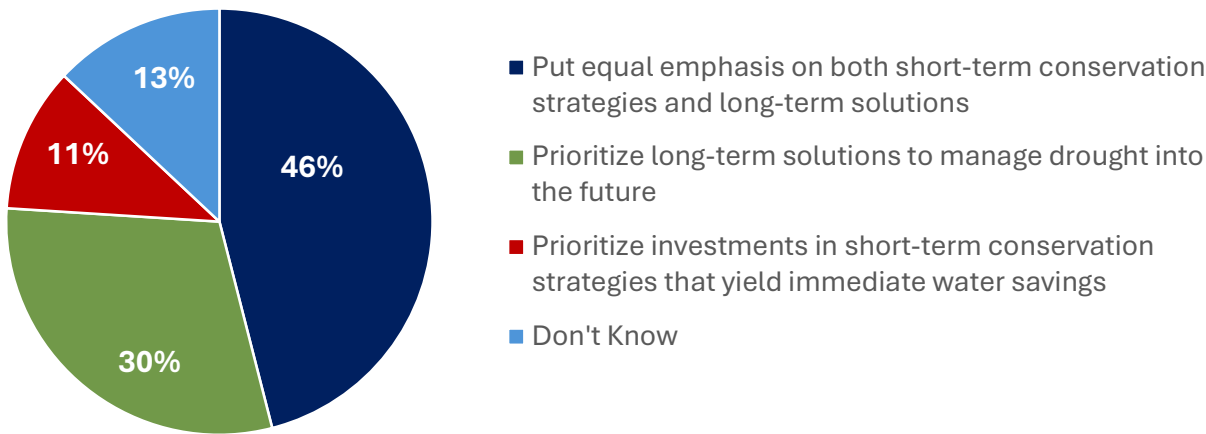

The Walton Family Foundation sponsored this multi-state project. This poll was conducted by Morning Consult between June 12-19, 2026, among a sample of 2,474 registered voters across 7 states, including 200 in New Mexico. 106 interviews were conducted in New Mexico's Colorado River Basin counties and those who draw water from the basin. The interviews were conducted online, and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of Adults based on age, gender, race/ethnicity, education, and party identification, within each state.
